• The college uses computerized accounting system for all its functions like budgeting and allocation of funds, voucher details, bank reconciliation, monthly report generation, payment and receipt records and other such functions. • The Library uses computerized facilities for the following functions like Stock Verifications, Issuing of Books, Return of Books. The College Library has an enabling unit to cater the differently abled students. The Library has Student Aid Fund which contains 23920 books in the year. • The College office uses management system in maintaining students and staff data such as students attendance, assessment marks, examinations marks etc. • The college maintains personnel information management of students and staff in hard copies such as record of identity cards, leave related records etc. Digitization process will take some

time to complete. In the subsequent years however, we will be able to have this system in place on a digital platform.

#### CRITERION I – CURRICULAR ASPECTS

#### 1.1 - Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

Efficient planning is a key component in implementation of curriculum. Preparation for each semester begins in the last phase of the previous semester itself. College academic calendar is designed and framed much before the beginning of semesters and planning for the next semester are done well in time. The transition to the CBCS adopted by the University of Delhi has generated the need to provide students with a feasible degree of choice as far as papers are chosen and therefore, details of the choices offered. We have, thus, started taking options from students well before the semester begins so that the college departments are well prepared to cater to the student's preferences. Workload calculation is done on the basis of choices offered by the students. Additional faculty is hired if required. As per the policy of the college to promote choice-based papers and to cater to students need, the departments are encouraged to give freedom to the students. In order to optimise the efficiency of curriculum delivery, the teachers are required to prepare teaching plans well before the beginning of the semester. Thus, Pre-Semester planning includes taking GE course options from students for calculation and distribution of workload, time table formulation and faculty recruitment, if required. The students are encouraged to make informed choices, and in order to assist students to make choices that fit into their career goals and interests, orientation session for GE is held to apprise students of its salient features and future prospects of Generic Electives being offered by each department in a particular semester. Periodic review of curriculum delivery is carried out during department meetings and any mid-course correction done if required. Each department strives to ensure that there is an efficient curriculum delivery mechanism and teachers are encouraged to use innovative teaching-learning methods to achieve this goal. The college administration supports the departments in this process in every possible way by providing infrastructural support for effective curriculum delivery. Efficient curriculum delivery was ensured and college administration provided all the possible assistance to teachers and students. At the end of each semester, teachers submit internal assessment marks in accordance with the department wise guidelines. Moderation of these marks is conducted at the department and the college level. Another important element of post semester activities is collection of student feedback on various parameters related to curriculum and its delivery. This feedback is a critical input for the IQAC to evaluate the efficacy of curriculum delivery and implement steps to improve it in the next semester. All these activities were carried out for the semester ending May 2018,

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2.5.2 - Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Since, we are a constituent institution of Delhi University, we must follow all of the protocols of the University for student internal assessment. To compute the consolidated semester grades, the internal assessment grades are coupled with the semester-end examination grades. Given the working of the semester system, which are very hectic in terms of working hours for students and teachers, and where each teaching day accounts for a significant portion of the total teaching per semester, a minor blunder on the part of a student can derail his or her preparations and send him down a path with very negative consequences. As a result, ongoing evaluation is critical. This continual evaluation can take the shape of class examinations, quizzes, and participation in class discussions, all of which help students consolidate what theyve learned in class.

2.5.3 – Academic calendar prepared and adhered for conduct of Examination and other related matters (250 words)

The calendars allow each department to plan the academic and co-curricular activities in a systematic and cohesive manner. It records the days allocated for assignments, seminars, department fests, mentorship programs etc. Various departments of the college and other committees work in tandem for academic calendar preparation so that all the student-centric activities apart from academics too get an adequate space within its ambit. We have created infrastructure that is accessible to differently-abled people. As a result, the physical, academic, and support facilities existing in the college are all accessible to those who are differently abled. Some of the classrooms are air-conditioned and equipped with LCD projectors. A Seminar Room is available for symposia, seminars, and conferences at the college. Our library is well-equipped and well-stocked, with access to the internet and electronic resources. The Basketball Court, Play Field, Cricket Pitch, Football Uprights and Volleyball Court give many chances for students to participate in sports and extracurricular activities. The

institution has a RO water system for everyone . We also have a rainwater collecting system, a specialized medical room, a girls Common Room, Ramps and a washroom for differently-abled students. Physical infrastructure maintenance: 1. The Library Committee, which includes an experienced and skilled library staff, is in charge of the librarys growth. Books, periodicals, and other items are acquired after extensive consultations with employees and teachers. 2. Each laboratory has dedicated lab assistants and attendants who perform routine maintenance on valuable equipment and take frequent stock of chemicals and other goods. 3. The college has one basketball coach and one yoga coach, as well as one attendant and four non-teaching personnel who function as ground crew. 4. We have internet resources, and other web-enabled services on the college campus. 5. A monitoring system has been installed on the college campus to avoid any unpleasant incidents. CCTV cameras are installed across the area. 6. With the help and efforts of gardeners and caretakers, the colleges garden committee constantly monitors and strives to provide a beautiful environment on campus. It also commemorated Green Day by encouraging and motivating teachers and students to plant trees. 7. Office attendants assist with administrative tasks as well as the correct upkeep of the colleges infrastructure. 8. The college offers an infirmary that is staffed by a full-time trained doctor and is available to both staff and students. 9. The Administrative Officer is responsible for the general maintenance of the college premises. 10. The different facilities available in College are done in a straightforward and open manner. Students complete an application for use of a facility, and the same is forwarded by the concerned convener or teacher in charge, which is then accepted by the Principal.
