<u>1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY</u>

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Motilal Nehru College was established in1964 as Government Degree College and began functioning from the premises of a government school building at Moti Bagh, New Delhi. In1965 it was renamed 'Degree College' and came under the administrative control of a government-nominated autonomous Governing Body comprising of eminent educationists and bureaucrats. It was further renamed as Hastinapur College in 1967. However, in 1977 it was again renamed after the illustrious nationalist leader, Pandit Motilal Nehru. In 1989, it was shifted to its present site where it has built a beautiful campus over the years, significantly augmenting its infrastructure and resources.

The college began its journey with just one course, viz. BA (Pass), 10 teachers and 274 students, but by mid-1970's, it started Honours courses, increased its faculty strength to 60 and student strength to 938. A few years later, it was recognized as 'Extended College' by the University of Delhi and had up to 1500 students. Currently, it has over 5000 students enrolled in 17 courses (14 undergraduate and 3 postgraduate), 142 faculty members in 11 departments, and over 100 administrative staff-members.

During a period spanning close to six decades, the college has come to be recognized as a premier institute of higher education in south Delhi. This achievement is the result of the commitment, zeal and enterprise of generations of teachers, students and administrative staff, in spite of many challenges. From its humble beginnings in a small school building to a state-of-the-art institution with a sprawling campus of 9.87 acres at a prime location connected with all modes of public transport (including Metro), Motilal Nehru College has, indeed, come a long way. Today, it attracts students not only from different sections of society all over India but also from foreign shores. It is thus poised to become the country's leading institution in higher education in the years to come.

Vision

Swami Vivekanand said, 'Education is the manifestation of the perfection already in Man'. Internalizing his view, the college believes in providing affordable and good quality higher education to all sections of society. It envisions playing an impactful role in the lives of its students, not only by helping them acquire the requisite knowledge and skillsets to excel academically and professionally, but also by motivating them to become conscientious and responsible citizens committed to the betterment of society. In doing so, it visualizes them as becoming capable of synthesizing their learning with societal needs, and of taking the initiative and lead in making the society more democratic and equitable for all sections. As our former president A.P.J. Abdul Kalam said, the purpose of education is to make good human beings with skill and expertise and such enlightened human beings can be created by teachers. Hence, the role of the teacher is very vital in making good and responsible citizens.

The college also sees itself as an incubator of academic freedom and excellence, as well as creativity and originality of thoughts. It aims to foster a spirit of socio-cultural inclusivity and harmony among students from diverse socio-economic, regional, linguistic and cultural backgrounds, and make them able contributors to nation-building.

Mission

The mission of the college is to:

- encourage and enable its students to live up to its motto, *buddhir-gyanena shuddhyati* ('Mind is refined by knowledge'), i.e. to constantly seek and acquire knowledge in a way that would make them think rationally, analyze critically, conceive and experiment with creative ideas, decide wisely, act responsibly, and cultivate and effectively articulate a liberal, unprejudiced worldview .
- sensitize them about their duties and responsibilities towards the family, community, society, environment and country, in order to make them informed, ethical, humane, sensible, empowered and responsible citizens.
- further a dynamic, stimulating, multi-faceted and technologically enhanced learning environment that would hone their aptitude and build their knowledge-base, skill-sets and leadership qualities, as well as orient them towards addressing the needs and challenges of the country and the world.
- enhance their professional and life skills and thereby build stellar careers.
- facilitate their holistic personality development by encouraging them to participate in academic, cocurricular and extra-curricular activities.
- promote inclusivity and diversity of ideas, opinions and people; deter discrimination/ exclusion/ marginalization on any ground; and thereby create a liberal, accommodating and enabling environment.
- inspire faculty members evermore to become empathetic and committed teachers as well as bright, innovative researchers.

1.2 Strength, Weakness, Opportunity and Challenges(SWOC)

Institutional Strength

- The college has an efficient curriculum delivery mechanism in place that includes pre-semester planning, orientation sessions for teacher-student interaction, due adherence to timetables and teaching plans by faculty members, use of innovative teaching-learning methods including ICT-based ones, continuous multi-mode internal assessment, periodic review of curriculum progress at the departmental level, and mentorship, tutorial and feedback systems.
- The college offers short-term skill-development courses every year in order to enhance the students' professional skills. Also the college has built a vibrant entrepreneurial environment which gives ample opportunity to the students to exhibit, explore and build their entrepreneurial skills.
- The college maintains an inclusive approach to education by providing students from diverse backgrounds ample opportunities and resources for curricular learning and extra-curricular activities. It offers relaxation in cut-off percentage to girls for admission to several courses; maintains one of the lowest fee structures in the University; and provides scholarships, fee concessions and book bank facility to needy students. The buildings have disabled-friendly access, and the library has a dedicated computer section for the visually challenged. Further, the Girls' Common Room provides a exclusive private space for female students.
- The college has an adequate ICT infrastructure which is being constantly upgraded and expanded to keep up with newer demands and needs.
- The college shows its commitment to environmental conservation through waste-management and ecofriendly practices.

- The Admissions Committee (Grievances), Anti-Ragging Committee and the Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) ensure a speedy redressal of grievances. The entire campus is under CCTV-enabled surveillance to ensure everyone's safety.
- The College National Seminar Committee, Ambedkar Study Circle, Gandhi Study Circle and departmental societies regularly organize seminars/ conferences/ talks.
- Participative management is ensured through a collective-decision making process at various levels, involving the Governing Body, the Principal, the Staff Council and its committees and sub-committees.
- Student members of Enactus, National Social Service (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC) and Entrepreneurship Cell have an exemplary record of social outreach activities and innovative projects.
- The faculty members regularly enhance their knowledge and pedagogical skills by participating in workshops/refresher courses/FDPs; publish and present their research; undertake projects; and contribute to development of curriculum and e-content.

Institutional Weakness

- The college lacks adequate infrastructure to accommodate its 4500+ students. The student-intake far exceeds the existing infrastructural capacity. While attempts have been made to address the problem by the addition of new buildings and reading rooms in the library, a compounding factor has been the sharing of infrastructural resources with Motilal Nehru College (Evening) which leads to the curtailment of some part of the teaching time and most of the extension programmes. Further, the intent to start new skill-development courses and offer more course choices under the current CBCS system is also hampered by this lack of adequate infrastructure.
- The college lacks flexibility of independent curricular development in the current scheme of the University system. While the college delivers the curriculum prescribed by the university, the specifics of the college-based needs sometimes become difficult to address promptly.
- Due to the phased construction of the buildings, the college is not able to provide sufficient space to the various cells and societies.
- Lack of an auditorium with a large seating capacity is an impediment to organizing large-scale programmes.

Institutional Opportunity

- The intake of a significant number of first-generation college-going students as also those from underprivileged socio-economic backgrounds allows the college a noble opportunity to play a transformative role in their lives and the society at large by way of providing them inexpensive quality education which is their only avenue of upward mobility.
- The innovative ICT-based pedagogical approaches that came to be widely used during the Covidinduced lockdown have not only encouraged the teachers to enhance their core curriculum-delivery skills through ICT tools but also offered the college an opportunity to expand and upgrade its ICT infrastructure. Thus, the college plans to increase the number of Wi-Fi connections and access points to ease and smoothen the use of such tools within the campus.
- The college has taken the opportunity to install solar panels on its rooftop spaces, in order to generate electricity for street-lights in the campus. The design patent for solar charge and utility patent for solar lights made of plastic and aluminum boxes have been applied for, and await approval.
- The college sees a unique opportunity of extending its social outreach as an institution, by facilitating and expanding the scale and scope of the award-winning innovative social entrepreneurship projects of

the Enactus team.

- There has been a notable rise in the number of students getting off- and on-campus internships and job placements in MNCs and other reputed organizations due to the efforts of the Placement and Entrepreneurship Cells. This creates significant opportunities for increasing the students' career-awareness and interface with the industry through more intense and focused career counseling programmes in collaboration with counseling agencies, as well as greater frequency of company-visits and talks by industry experts and leaders from diverse areas.
- The positive response of the students to short-term skill-development certificate courses has encouraged the college to work towards offering new and varied courses of longer durations.
- Considering the increased participation of faculty members in Faculty Development Programmes, the college plans to organize such programmes on a regular basis within the campus.

Institutional Challenge

- One of the biggest challenges for the institution is to adapt to the demands of rapidly changing societal values and equip students with skillsets and knowledge required for increasing their employability in the ever-evolving competitive job market. For this, the college has already initiated skill based courses and provided an entrepreneurial climate for the students. But there is still a need to strike a balance between the rigorous delivery of its core academic programmes and the introduction of relevant skill-development courses.
- The institutional commitment to maintain a low fee structure and provide affordable education to all is yet another challenge in the face of budgetary constraints, enrolment of a sizeable number of students from socio-economically disadvantaged sections who need financial assistance, and the government's policy shift towards autonomy and self-financing in higher education.
- The lack of affordable hostel facilities makes accommodating students from remote parts of the country in the campus a challenge, especially in view of the institution's emphasis on inclusivity and diversity.
- Balancing the increasing co-curricular and administrative responsibilities with mandatory academic commitments (teaching and research) is a challenge for the faculty, and this, in turn, is also a challenge for the institution that requires efficient functioning of the academics and administration on the one hand and steady research output of the teachers on the other—in order to maintain its reputation.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

- As a constituent college of the University of Delhi, Motilal Nehru College implements choice based credit system (CBCS) in curriculum, which provides an opportunity to the students to choose courses from a variety of generic elective and skill-enhancement courses. Each department conducts an orientation session for the GE courses that it offers in order to apprise students of their salient features and future prospects and thereby encourage them to make informed choices aligned with their career goals and interests.
- The college undertakes pre-semester planning which includes taking Generic Elective (GE) course options from students, workload calculation, faculty recruitment, preparation and distribution of timetables.
- In order to ensure effective curriculum delivery, the teachers are encouraged to prepare teaching plans well before the beginning of each semester and use innovative teaching-learning methods including ICT-

based ones. Each department allocates courses to teachers in accordance with their specializations and interests, prepares its timetable within the broad framework of the University's academic calendar and conducts a periodic review of curriculum delivery in its meetings.

- Some teachers are members of course committees of the parent departments in the University and actively contribute to discussion, improvement and learning outcomes of the curricula. Many teachers are involved in the proceedings of the Academic council/ BoS of the University, setting of question papers, design and development of curriculum, and assessment/evaluation. Some teachers are also involved in developing e-content for e-PG-Pathshala and Svayamprabha.
- The college regularly offers several short-term skill-development courses in collaboration with corporate organizations in order to enhance the students' professional skills and employability. In the last five years, the college offered several such short-term (30-60-hour) courses in areas such as Telecommunications, and Tourism and Hospitality (2016); Entrepreneurship (2017); Banking and Finance (2018); Equity Markets (2018); and French language (A1 level, 2019, 2020). The courses attracted enthusiastic student participation.
- The college offers 'Environmental studies' as Ability Enhancement Compulsory Course (AECC) for all programs, while various departments such as English, History, Political Science and Hindi teach courses on gender, human rights, and/or environment, as well as organize seminars/talks and educational trips to sensitize students about these subjects.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

- The college admits students as per the approved sanctioned strength and reservation policies of GoI.
- Every year, at the beginning of the academic session, the college organizes an orientation session to initiate the interaction of newly admitted students with their teachers.
- The departments and committees, following the University's academic calendar, plan the academic and co-curricular activities of the college in a systematic and cohesive manner so that all the student-centric activities including sports, too, get adequate space within its ambit.
- The college has an effective mentorship program to address their academic and non-academic needs (e.g., financial assistance, access to learning resources, moral and mental wellbeing, and career guidance).
- The faculty utilizes extra classes for slow learners and tutorial classes for focused and personalized interactions with small groups (10-15) of students.
- In the last five years, the college has maintained a healthy student-teacher ratio of 32: 1 and a high passing percentage (92.89).
- The college maintains a robust mechanism of continuous internal assessment to monitor and evaluate the academic progress of students through various methods such as class tests, quizzes, presentations, debates, group discussions, case studies, and projects involving field-visits. The marks submitted by the teachers are moderated, and grievances are resolved at the department and college levels.
- Feedback on various parameters of curriculum-delivery are collected from students and analyzed at various levels to identify problem-areas and take corrective actions.
- The college is Wi-Fi-enabled and has five ICT-enabled classrooms. During the Covid-induced lockdown of 2020-21, the teachers extensively used ICT tools for teaching, sharing learning resources, assessment and counseling.
- The college has a high percentage (78) of full-time teachers (142) out of the total sanctioned posts (182). The majority of teachers is young and dedicated, and has the requisite teaching and research experience.

- The teachers regularly participate in faculty development/refresher/orientation programmes/workshops to update their knowledge and pedagogical skills.
- The college and its different departments regularly organize seminars/ conferences/ workshops/ panel discussions/ talks to familiarize the students with current trends and advances in research and bring about industry-academia interface, wherever required.

Research, Innovations and Extension

- The faculty members are encouraged to undertake doctoral/post-doctoral studies and fellowships and research projects, publish their research, and present papers on various academic forums. In the last five years, several teachers have (a) undertaken projects sponsored by the University of Delhi and other premier institutions such as Indian Council of Social Science Research (ICSSR), M.S. Merian–R. Tagore International Centre of Advanced Studies and University of Wurzberg (Germany); (b) authored books, articles in several UGC-notified and other peer-reviewed journals, book chapters, and papers in conference proceedings; and (c) completed their Ph.D., while several others are involved in guiding/supervising research scholars.
- Student-members of Enactus, NSS and NCC conduct exemplary social outreach and awareness-building activities throughout the year. The Enactus has gathered accolades from institutions in India and abroad for its innovative social entrepreneurship projects. Most notably, it received the Genpact Campus Impact Award from TERI and Genpact in 2016; mentorship from KPMG in 2020; and a seed grant of USD 1000 from The Pollination Project (TPP) a US-based organization for its project 'DESI' for sterilization and vaccination of stray dogs in 2020. The NSS, NCC and Enactus organized several activities such as camps for free dental check-up, blood-donation, self-defence, and yoga; and drives/campaigns for mask-distribution, sapling-plantation, donation of food & clothes to the poor, cleanliness, sanitation and personal hygiene in slums, animal-feeding, river-conservation, financial literacy, vaccination of campus dogs, etc. The NSS also organized seminars, webinars, workshops, street plays and competitions for raising awareness about many topical issues such as environment, waste-management, water conservation, women's safety, human rights, humane treatment of animals and birds, Covid-19, lifestyle diseases, etc. Many of these were held on the occasion of government-initiated campaigns (e.g., National Yoga Day, Swachh Bharat Abhiyan, Fit India Movement, Personal Hygiene Day, Jal Shakti Abhiyan, National Voters Day, National Youth Day, etc.).
- Students are encouraged to ideate and execute innovative projects. For instance, the Entrepreneurship Cell launched a business start-up, 'Printing Bus' in 2019.
- The college signed MoUs with corporate organizations and a premier government agency (viz. National Institute for Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development) for teaching skill-based certificate courses.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The Staff Council constitutes a number of committees and sub-committees that supervise the utilization and maintenance of support facilities.
- The college has 45 classrooms including five rooms and a 70-seater Seminar Room equipped with ICTenabled facilities and LCD projectors.
- The entire campus is Wi-Fi-enabled with12 access points.
- The college has been constantly augmenting its physical and IT infrastructure. Two air-conditioned reading rooms were added to the library in 2019 taking the total number to three. There are

150 computers available for use by students with an effective student-computer ratio of 32:1.

- The library is stocked with over one lakh books and a number of periodicals/magazines, and equipped with subscription-based e-resources and screen-reading software. It has a dedicated unit with a Braille library, computers and facilities for reading, writing, scanning and printing for the visually impaired students. It also has a Student Aid Fund or book bank with over 23,000 books from which deserving and needy students borrow books for a considerable period of time. The library is fully automated with Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) software. A significant number of books, journals and magazines are added every year as per the recommendations by the faculty.
- The college has adequate facilities for sports: a playground, a cricket pitch, football uprights, volleyball and basketball courts, good sports equipment, changing rooms and one coach each for basketball and yoga.
- The Cultural Committee with its seven societies organizes all cultural events, and has a room for students to rehearse for such events.
- Each laboratory has devoted lab assistants and attendants to carry out regular maintenance of equipments and take stock of all consumable and non-consumable items.
- The college has an RO plant for purification of drinking water, rainwater harvesting system, Girls' Common Room and a medical room manned by a qualified doctor.
- The college has ramps and exclusive washrooms for differently-abled students.
- The Garden Committee works to give a substantial green cover to the campus with the help of gardeners and caretakers.
- ICT and e-governance tools are extensively used for enhancing and speeding up all administrative activities.

Student Support and Progression

- The college provides its students ample opportunities and adequate support facilities to participate in a variety of co-curricular activities in order to ensure their holistic development.
- The Admissions Committee (Grievances) addresses admission-related grievances of applicants. The Anti-Ragging Committee raises awareness of the statutory prohibition of ragging and ensures immediate redress of any grievances arising out of cases of ragging. The Internal Complaints Committee (ICC) vigilantly works towards the prevention of sexual harassment and provides a safe and confidential interface to the complainants.
- Every year students across categories benefit from various scholarships and fee concessions from the college. Some departments, viz. History, Mathematics and Commerce have their own scholarship schemes for meritorious students. In the last five years, over 10% students have been recipients of such scholarships and freeships.
- The college has a dynamic and elected students' union, comprised of President, Vice president, General Secretary, Joint Secretary, Treasurer and Councilors, along with student-volunteers. The union, along with the Cultural Committee, organizes multiple programmes throughout the year. The union has taken up the issues of students such as starting the bus route on the south campus road. In addition to the union, the college students also have representatives in the college committees constituted by the Staff Council.
- Various cells and societies, proactively managed by student-members, organize sporting and cultural events, festivals and seminars/ talks/ workshops. They also send teams to participate in off-campus competitive events.
- The college has a stellar record of university-/ state-/ national-/ international-level awards for outstanding performance of students in sports and cultural activities.

- Societies such as the Placement Cell and Internship Cell have helped channelizing the students' careers by providing them internship and final placement opportunities. There has been a notable rise in the number of students getting internships and job placements (57 in 2017-18, 63 in 2018-19, 73 in 2019-20, 99 in 2020-21), as well as of those opting for higher education.
- The college has an active Alumni Association, registered in 2012 under the Societies Registration Act, 1860. It organizes alumni meets every year.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The college, while working within the hierarchical structure of governance mandated by the University, adopts a democratic, collective and participatory approach in all its operations and decision-making processes. Since building leadership is an integral component of holistic education, the college strives to inculcate in the students and teachers such leadership qualities that promote collective decision-making and participatory management.
- At the apex of the administrative set-up of the college is the Governing Body which has two teacher representatives to voice staff and student perspectives in its discussions. The Governing Body is followed by other administrative positions, viz. Principal; Vice-Principal; Secretary Staff Council; Bursar; Coordinator, IQAC, and liason officers.
- Staff Council, the statutory decision-making body of the college, constitutes a number of committees (approx. 30), comprised of teachers and students, to organize all academic, cultural, sporting and development-related activities.
- The college has an elected staff association to look after the teachers' interests, and a similar association for the non-teaching staff as well. Besides, the Council has also constituted a college welfare committee to look after the interests of entire staff.
- The IQAC of the college strives to improve the quality of academic and administrative performance.
- The faculty recruitment and promotion are conducted through an institutional framework as per the University rules and UGC guidelines. Under the CAS 2018 scheme of the University, all the eligible candidates were duly promoted.
- The college follows the University's and GoI's guidelines for appraisal. Each teacher is required to outline his/ her annual achievements in the Annual Performance Appraisal Report (APAR), while the Annual Confidential Report (ACR) of each non-teaching staff-member's performance is written by the concerned administrative officer.
- The college uses Public Fund Management System (PFMS) to regularly record all its payments and receipts.
- The college receives funds mainly from the UGC and Delhi Government. However, some students and teachers also receive grants for project work or attending conferences.
- The college has introduced e-governance in significant operations such as administration, finance and accounts, admissions and examinations. To meet the challenges posed by the Covid- induced lockdown, the college strategically shifted all its operations to online mode.

Institutional Values and Best Practices

• Committed to the spirit of nation-building, the college is guided in its institutional practices by the noble vision of promoting gender-parity, women empowerment, education for disadvantaged sections of the society, cultural diversity and environmental consciousness. Hence, it imparts a holistic education that, among other things, inculcates the values and mindset necessary for creating a plural, sustainable and

inclusive society.

- The ICC and WDC spearhead various initiatives to promote the ideas of gender-equality and womenempowerment, as also sensitize the staff and students about various gender-related issues. These include seminars, discussions, film-screening, book-reading sessions and competitive events on diverse themes such as the ICC's role in the prevention of sexual harassment of women; gender-stereotypes in careerchoices; misogynist speech and casual sexism; physical assaults on women; plight of transgender communities; patriarchal notions of masculinity, bodily autonomy and beauty; feminism and feminist movements; female financial literacy; and personal hygiene and reproductive health of women. Further, several departments offer relaxation in the admission cut-off to female students. Constant CCTVenabled surveillance ensures their security, and the Girls Common Room addresses their need for privacy.
- The college provides fee concession to needy students, disabled-friendly access to the building and toilet, and appropriate learning resources for the visually challenged. The college is committed to providing affordable quality education by maintaining one of the lowest fee structures in the University.
- The college has vibrant NCC and NSS units that undertake various initiatives to inculcate civic values and social responsibility amongst the students. These include a wide range of outreach activities and celebration of national and international commemorative days.
- The college sensitizes its staff and students about the conservation of environment and natural resources through various measures such as the displaying signages with motivational messages, installing rainwater harvesting system, digging a compost pit, switching to waterless urinals, installing solar-powered street-lights, plantation drives and talks/seminars and competitive activities on environmental issues.
- The college exhibits peaceful coexistence between animals and humans as the campus dogs are fed daily by students. Their sterilization has curtailed growth in their population. Adminstering anti-rabies vaccine to the dogs every year has made the campus safe for all.

Institutional preparedness for NEP

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	The emphasis on National Education Policy is to transmit knowledge and information in an interdisciplinary manner. This can enable students from diverse background to feel more accommodated in the existing educational patterns. The new policy is different from the earlier educational policies as the emphasis of previous policies such as 1986 education policy was more on developing a uniform education system for entire country; which is also known as 10+2+3 system. The National Education Policy, which is going to be implemented, by the University of Delhi from August 2022 will change not only the 10+2+3 pattern but also will bring many changes into course structures; which will be of the more interdisciplinary nature. Motilal Nehru College is a constituent college of University of Delhi and is glad to implement NEP from the next academic session.
2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	Academic bank of credits (ABC) is new scheme introduced by National Education Policy (NEP). This scheme gives a students choice to exit while doing a programme or course in a College or University for example while taking admission to four years UG course if a students want to exit after one year or two years, he or she is entitles to do so. In such cases the credits earned by a student in one or two years will be credited into his or her bank. These credits can be used in India or abroad while pursuing a UG course in any discipline.
3. Skill development:	National Education Policy is focused upon creating a more self reliant youth; who is not dependent on job opportunities created by others. This purpose can only be achieved through the more skillful and a trend youth. The set goal is likely to be achieved by the introduction of skill development courses right from the school education level. NEP, therefore is a landmark decision to have skill education starting right from class 6th onwards.
4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):	This is to bring to the knowledge to the all concerned that Motilal Nehru College can not offer online courses as our parent University does not give us this mandate. We understand though that NEP has lot of emphasis on online education system. It is also understood that the above policy wants to inculcate knowledge and information in once own language and with Indian value based system.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):	Any education system which is not focused on outcome can not survive for a long time. We often here about educated youth not getting sufficient employment opportunities or working in an environment which is not worthy of his/her educational qualification. The National Education Policy (NEP) with emphasis on introducing more skill based courses training programmes and other such endeavors; which will be beneficial for the new generation and will make our education system more outcome based. Further, what makes NEP more outcome based is the fact that it gives education in once own language and own cultural surroundings. That can help an individual to more connected with education and do not fill the difference between theory and practice, which used to be the case earlier.
6. Distance education/online education:	Covid-19 has taught us different means and ways of teaching-learning process to be carried out. All the teachers of our college and other stakeholders remained in touch with the students through classroom teaching and other methods of online mode. However, University of Delhi does not give us mandate to introduce online or correspondence courses which is known as distance learning in online mode. In 2021-22 though our college tried to organize faculty development programme and research methodology Ad-on-course in online mode. In future given an opportunity our College will try to introduce distance learning.

1.1 Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

Response:

The college believes in adopting a holistic approach towards the effective delivery of curriculum through a structured and transparent process. Beginning with the design, planning and implementation of the curriculum, a methodical approach is adopted, enabling the effective completion of the curriculum. All the departments follow the curriculum designed and prescribed by University of Delhi. The teachers also often work as members on the Board of Studies in various disciplines. University of Delhi updates the syllabus periodically for UG and PG Courses. All updation is incorporated as soon as it is adopted by the University's academic and executive bodies. All the courses are offered in semester mode. The college in tandem with the University prepares academic calendar for well-planned curriculum delivery. There is a strict adherence to the time-table and course plan.

Teachers are required to prepare teaching plans well before the beginning of the semester. Thus, Pre-Semester Planning includes taking Generic Elective (G.E.) course options from students for workload calculation and distribution, timetable formulation, and faculty recruitment, if required. The students are encouraged to make informed choices. In order to assist students to make choices that fit into their career goals and interests, orientation session for GE is held to apprise students of its salient features and future prospects as offered by each department in a particular semester. Periodic review of curriculum delivery is carried out during department meetings and any mid-course correction done if required. Each department strives to ensure that there is an efficient curriculum delivery mechanism and teachers are encouraged to use innovative teaching-learning methods to achieve this goal. The course plan involves and encourages the teachers to include various methods like power point presentation, group discussions, seminars, experiential learning, debates and discussions to ensure effective undertanding of each segment. Guest lectures by eminent personalities in the relevant area, workshops, and short-term projects are also included in imparting quality education. The college administration supports the departments in this process in every possible way by providing infrastructural support for effective curriculum delivery. In the concluding semesters of the present academic session, lockdown owing to COVID resulted in new challenges in curriculum delivery which were addressed by the teachers through online modes of teaching. Special attention was paid to students who faced network issues, by encouraging the participant students to record the lectures and share the same with the students who could not login owing to technical glitches. Therefore, through an enabling approach the teaching-learning process was conducted without interruption while the college administration provided all the possible assistance to teachers and students. At the end of each semester, teachers submit internal assessment marks in accordance with the department wise guidelines. Moderation of these marks is conducted at the department and the college level. Another important element of post semester activities is collection of student feedback on various parameters related to curriculum and its delivery.

Response:

Motilal Nehru College follows the Academic Calendar prepared by the University of Delhi. The academic calender that mentions the dates of the commencement and completion of semesters and the schedules for admissions and examinations are displayed on the college website. Nonetheless, within this broad framework, every department of the college designs its own academic calendar and timetables before the commencement of the session for smooth and effective functioning. The students are informed about the academic calendar and the same is uploaded on the college website and displayed on notice boards. During the Orientation Programme conducted every year at the begining of the session, the first-year students are informed about the syllabus, optional papers available and requirements for Internal Assessment. The schedule for external examinations is fixed by the University of Delhi and the same is displayed on the college website and notice boards for the students. For the Internal Assessment (25 marks), as mandated by the University of Delhi, 10 marks for assignment, 10 marks for tests/project, and 5 marks for attendance are allotted. The course teachers schedule and announce the tests, assignments and projects as per the departmental academic calendar, spread out through the semester, and the students are required to make submissions of assignments/projects within the deadline.Continuous evaluation of students is done by the faculty members through innovative teaching pedagogies and techniques like in-class debates and discussions, case studies, field visits and project works. Talks/conferences/seminars/workshops on syllabusrelated topics form significant components are incorporated in the academic calendar. Internships, within and outside the College, are encouraged as part of evaluation. The college strictly monitors the attendance of the students and they are required to fulfill the minimum attendance criteria. For the papers that are accompanied with hands-on training, practical examinations are conducted in the college's Computer Lab, along with internal/external viva-voce, as per the requirement. Since the Covid-19 pandemic, the academic calendar is being revised periodically for teaching learning process to continue smoothly.

Rainwater harvesting is done to save water. The college regularly conducts and organizes talks/seminars and activities on environmental issues to educate and sensitize everyone in the college. The above initiatives are examples of our focus on environmental issues and the need to adopt sustainable measures. 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The faculty utilises the tutorial classes to interact with a small group of students and access the understanding level of each student. Special focus is given to solve the doubts of the students at the individual level. Extra classes are also held for the students whose learning curve may be different. The students are continuously monitored in the Practical classes too. The students who are slow in understanding and performing the experiments are encouraged to attend extra practical classes so that all the students can perform the experiments at their own speed and gain thorough understanding of the subject.

The students of Motilal Nehru College come from diverse backgrounds and display different learning abilities. Based on Class XII marks, students of B.Com and B.A. (P) are allotted language papers, classified into different sections, which help in varied levels of language learning. With respect to classroom pedagogy, as a typical procedure, slow and advanced learners are identified through standard evaluation methods and class participation. Thereafter, the pedagogy in the classroom is pitched in a manner that matches the pace of different learning abilities of students. In order to provide suitable learning opportunities, teachers customize tasks, projects and activities like discussions, quizzes, film screenings, tests and real-life research projects. Teachers promote class participation by giving opportunities to students to take initiatives and make decisions. Using experiential approach, teachers inculcate multiple perspectives, and diverse viewpoints. A wide spectrum of methods, like oral, written, role-plays, are used to engage non-participative students and increase their receptive, reflective and retention abilities.One-on-one interaction with teachers and mentors beyond class hours has been very effective in dealing with the concerns of both the slow and advanced learners. The institution strives to build a space of trust in the classroom and inculcate a sense of mutual care and respect. The students feel free and comfortable to share their opinions with each other, promoting peer-learning. Every faculty member engages with the students in their class to identify the slow Learners and advanced Learners. The faculty utilises the tutorial classes to interact with a small group of students and understand and analyze the understanding level of each student. Special focus is given to solve the doubts of the students at individual level. Continuous internal evaluation is significant to know the extent to which effective learning and progress has taken place.

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

The college primarily focuses on teaching and learning process. It emphasizes on various factors that help learners to work towards their goals and incorporate new skills, and knowledge that add to their range of learning experiences. During the lockdown caused by COVID-19, the teaching and learning was continued via online tools. The college also encourages its faculty members to organize various lectures, webinars, hands-on workshops, conferences, summits etc. for enhancing the skills of the students. Upgradation of infrastructure and knowledge creation through various academic exercises are all done keeping the student at the centre. Since, all modern teaching is planned by keeping the child at the centre, we at Motilal Nehru College have geared up to cater to the needs of our learners. It is indeed a matter of pride for us to mention that all our academic activities are student-centric.

The teachers at Motilal Nehru College integrate classroom-teaching with experiential learning through group activities, role-plays, film screening, group discussions. industrial visits and use of relevant examples from everyday life. 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

Being a constituent college of Delhi University, all the procedures prescribed by the University with respect to internal assessment of students are binding upon us. The internal assessment grades are combined with the semester-end examination grades to compute the consolidated semester results. We constantly try to promote a culture that encourages continuous evaluation in some form or the other. This has enhanced the productivity of the students' efforts by providing ample space for corrective action. Given the working of the semester system, which is very hectic in terms of working hours for students and teachers where each teaching day forms a substantial proportion of the total teaching per semester, a slight slip on the part of a student can derail his/her preparations and put her/him into a downward spiral with very undesirable consequences. Hence, continuous assessment is very important. This continuous evaluation may take place in the form of class tests, quizzes, presentations and/or participation in class

discussions that result in a consolidation of the underlying concepts learnt in class.

As per the University of Delhi guidelines, the College systematically conducts internal assessment to enhance the performance and regularity of the students in the classrooms. As per the University scheme, for most of the core and elective papers, the internal assessment is of 25 marks out of 100, while the external examination carries 75 marks in each semester. The Internal Assessment of 25 marks is further split into 10 Marks for assignment, 10 Marks for tests/project, and 5 Marks for attendance, as mandated by the University of Delhi. This internal assessment scheme is timely communicated to the students through the College portal. The internal assessment schedule and evaluation parameters for the different papers are informed to students at least 2-3 weeks in advance by the respective subject-teachers. Internal assessments are spread over a semester to ensure continuous evaluation. The assessments generally comprise some of the following modes: class presentations, projects, report writing, assignments, viva, group discussions, field work, class tests and practical tests. The marks obtained by the students are shared with them in the class and also through other mediums such as Google Classroom, WhatsApp, MS Teams and the College Website. All the test papers and answer scripts along with the list of marks are duly maintained by the respective faculty members for records. Feedback and remarks about their performance are shared with the students. The students are also guided to perform better in external examinations. Students who represent the College in sports, N.C.C., N.S.S. and other extra-curricular activities held in other Universities, are allowed additional time for submission of written assignments, projects and get the benefit of attendance for Internal Assessment for the classes missed. In exceptional circumstances, students may be assessed through an alternative mode. The faculty members formally submit the internal assessment award list to the college which is then seen and signed by every concerned student as per the University of Delhi guidelines. To ensure complete transparency, each student validates the internal assessment marks awarded by signing on the award list .Internal examination related grievances are addressed in a time-bound and efficient manner.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal/external examination related grievances is transparent, timebound and efficient

Response:

The college has a nodal officer for examination related grievances. It is compulsory for the college to resolve all grievances in a time bound manner. Further ,for internal examinations our college has a moderation committee which looks after the grievanaces of the students in respect of their internal examination.

Motilal Nehru College follows the guidelines set by the University of Delhi regarding the Internal Assessment in each semester. The Internal Assessment of 25 marks is further split into 10 marks for assignment, 10 marks for tests/project, and 5 marks for attendance, as mandated by the University of Delhi. At the beginning of the semester, faculty members inform the students about the internal assessment
composition criteria, which includes presentation, practical, class test, projects, viva-voce, internship fieldwork and other extra-curricular activities. Dates of the internal examination are communicated well in advance to the students. The evaluated internal test papers are returned to the students, with feedback, for self-assessment. The marks obtained by the students are uploaded on the notice board and College website along with their attendance. The students are required to validate its acceptance by signing the award list. In case of any grievances, the student directly approaches the concerned teachers, who address the grievances as she/he may deem fit. The unresolved grievances, if any, are referred to the teacher-in-charge of the department. Such issues are addressed and resolved in the departmental meetings. If a student is unable to appear for an internal examination due to medical or any other genuine reason, her/his IA is rescheduled subject to the production of proper documents.. External examiners are invited for viva-voce, wherever required. Grievances, if any, are addressed by the Grievance committee. Attendance is an integral part of internal assessment. Students who do not fulfil the minimum required attendance criteria are not issued admit cards for the semester examination. This systematic monitoring of students' attendance has had a positive impact on them regarding the importance of having adequate attendance. However, Medical Certificates are excluded while calculating marks to be awarded for attendance, though such certificates are considered for the purpose of calculating eligibility to appear for semester examinations. The College constitutes a Moderation Committee for Internal Assessment, as per the University of Delhi norms, to look into the students' grievances related to internal assessment and practical examinations, if any, and takes appropriate actions, as and when required. As per the University of Delhi norms, the College constitutes an Internal Assessment Monitoring Committee, Chaired by the Principal. This Committee is responsible for the entire process of Internal Assessment in the College. Unresolved internal assessment related grievances are taken up and resolved by this Committee. All members of this Committee counter-sign the hard-copy of the internal assessment before submitting it to the Examination Branch of the University,

2.6 Student Performance and Learning Outcomes

2.6.1 Programme and course outcomes for all Programmes offered by the institution are stated and displayed on website and communicated to teachers and students.

Response:

As a constituent institution of the University of Delhi, Motilal Nehru College follows the guidelines and norms of the University with respect to offered programmes and course curriculum/syllabus. The University of Delhi, under the Choice Based Credit System (CBCS), has revised the syllabus/course curriculum with targeted learning outcomes for each course/subject, based on the UGC-LOCF The learning outcomes of each paper are mentioned in the syllabus and are available on the University Website. The syllabus, the course outcomes and the credits allotted to each paper are communicated to the students during the Orientation Programme of the first year students. The students are encouraged to make informed choices, and in order to assist students to make choices that fit in into their career goals and interests, Orientation session for GE is held to apprise students of its salient features. The future prospects

of Generic Electives being offered by each department in a particular semester are also highlighted to make the students aware of the advantages of the course. Periodic review of curriculum delivery is carried out during department meetings and mid-course correction done, if required. Each department strives to ensure that there is an efficient curriculum delivery mechanism and teachers are encouraged to use innovative teaching-learning methods to achieve this goal. Each individual teacher apprises the students of the learning outcomes of the specific paper at the beginning and conclusion of the semester. The entire pedagogy is geared towards achieving the stated learning outcome of the paper. The students are made familiar with programme outcomes through workshops, student induction programmes, and parent-teacher interaction .Under the CBCS system of the University of Delhi, the undergraduate programme is divided into various components, comprising Core papers, Generic Elective papers, Ability Enhancement Compulsory papers, Skill Enhancement papers and Discipline Specific Elective papers. Each of these components in themselves have specific learning outcomes, which give a better understanding as to how and why the specific subject/topic is being taught. Course Outcomes as well as Learning Outcomes depend upon the nature of course and the subject concerned. The choices that the students make, based on the specified learning outcomes, help in a holistic understanding of the course, thereby enriching the teaching-learning process. The Programme Specific Outcomes are closely related to the content of the syllabus and may vary as per the subject. Teachers design Lesson Plans for all the courses/subjects at the beginning of each semester to ensure that the pedagogy is in sync with the PSOs. The students are encouraged, guided to learn and imbibe the course outcomes. The students are not only communicated the course outcome in the classroom, but also made to experience them through participation and organizing of co-curricular and extra-curricular activities. Every department plans and conducts all activities in light of the programme outcomes and course outcomes.

2.6.2 Attainment of programme outcomes and course outcomes are evaluated by the institution.

Response:

Direct and indirect methods are used to achieve program outcomes and Program Specific outcomes. Direct methods are used through examinations/observations of students' knowledge/skills against measurable course outcomes. The knowledge and skills resulting from the course outcomes are centred to specific problems on University Examination/internal exams and home assignments. Respective teachers conclude the Program Outcome attainment level. At the end of each semester, University conducts the final examination. It is agianst these results that the course outcomes are measured. Students are given assignments at the end of each module. While preparing the assignments, the students are advised to refer the textbooks and reference books. It helps them to evaluate, understand and resolve the critical academic issues assigned to them by the respective mentors. This is how the program and course outcomes are achieved by the dedicated staff of the college.

Aacademic development of the teachers and students is the top priority of the college. The Programme

Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are intrinsic to the design of the Programme/Course. The rationale of a studying a course is reflected well within the POs and COs. The teachers actively participate in seminars, FDPs, workshops and curriculum meetings which are regularly organized by the respective Departments at the college and University level to discuss the POs and COs. The College periodically keeps track of academic course completion and co-curricular events taking place within the Institution. The conduct of classes is planned at the beginning of each semester in departmental meetings, wherein TICs establish a time frame for preparation of course outline and Lesson Plans for each subject in tune with the academic calendar. Updates are regularly collected and processed by TIC till the end of semester. The teachers are requested from time to time to map the objectives to the outcomes and to analyse and document their resultants. The focus on the POs and COs had been maintained even when the classes have transited to the online mode. Talks, discussions, guest lectures, webinars, e-resources, guizzes and online evaluation process ensured efficient functioning of the institution to achieve the desired goals. The performance of students in University examinations and in different internal and external examinations is a parameter of outcome assessment. For the assessment of students, summative and formative approaches are followed to get intended learning outcomes. Over the years, the institution has consistently exhibited student progression in terms of improved results. There has been a steep rise in the number of students passing out with higher CGPA, including positions in the University merit list. This is also a parameter through which our college demonstrates its successful and effective strategy of delivering the POs and the COs.

Our college in this regard has taken a project by adopting stray dogs in the college neighbourhood, sterlize them and provide them basic facilities. Garden Committee of the college organizes workshops and awareness campaigns on tree plantation, food waste segregation, anticracker campaigns and energy conservation on a regular basis. Owing to Covid 19, last two years remained quiet as far as extension activities outdoor are concerned. Before that though, our college had initiated a plantation drive through which students were asked not only to plant a tree but also to take responsibilities of that planted tree for a year, after which they will be given a Green Student Certificate. Further, the College through CDF-Connecting Dreams Foundation is tirelessly working along the lines of 17 sustainable development goals as defined by the United Nations. The major thrust of CDF is to provide the youth with an opportunity to empower people through enterpreneurial action to improve their livelihoods in an economically, socially and environmentally sustainable way. This is how it endeavors to convert their dreams into reality. Our College got involved with CDF in the year 2017 and by now our students have been able to reach out to more than 70 communities with an involvement of more than a hundred students, and have transformed more than a hundred lives. CDF- Motilal has a number of projects to its credit like Project Dream library, Project Jazbaat- which lays focus on positive thinking and propagates it through its Instagram page and Talk traders sessions. Project Udyam of CDF Motilal Nehru College aims to strenghten and aid the unemployed married women coming from poor sections of society to become financially independent. The marketing department of CDF ensures that the hand made products of these underpriviledged women are aggressively marketed for the desired financial goals. It is worth mentioning here that CDF India was given the NGO leadership award for North India.

Criterion 4 - Infrastructure and Learning Resources

4.1 Physical Facilities

4.1.1 The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Response:

The procedures and policies followed by the college for maintaining and utilizing the infrastructure are aligned towards the overall development of our students who are usually morally upright, intellectually sound, and well-informed. Our endeavour is to ensure the maintenance of high academic standards along with the provision of a wide array of extra-curricular activities. We have ensured the development and existence of a differently-abled friendly infrastructure. As a result, the physical, academic and support facilities in the college are all differently-abled friendly. Some of the class rooms in the college are air conditioned and have LCD projectors. The college has an air-conditioned Seminar Room for holding symposia, seminar and conferences with the capacity of 70. Our library is well-equipped and adequately stocked and also has availability of Internet,e-resources and screen reading softwares, braille books and dedicated enabling unit for the visually impaired. The college is linked to the National Knowledge Network (GOI) through the University of Delhi. College provides ample opportunities to its students in Sports and extra-curricular activities and is equipped with a basketball court, a play field, a cricket pitch, football uprights, and a volleyball court. The college has an RO plant for all, rain water harvesting system, a dedicated medical room, and a Girl's common room. The college also has ramps, an exclusive washroom for differently-abled students, employees and visitors.

Maintenance of physical infrastructure:

1. The maintenance and updation of the library is done by a Library Committee which consists of an experienced and knowledgeable library and teaching staff. Books, magazines etc. are purchased after detailed discussions with the faculty.

2. Each laboratory has devoted lab assistants and attendants to carry out regular maintenance of equipments and take stock of all consumable and non consumable items.

3. The college has 01 coach for basketball, 01 for yoga apart from 01 attendant and 04 non-teaching staff who serve as ground men.

4. The computers and internet resources and other web enabled facilities in the college campus are provided by well qualified professionals.

5. The college campus has a surveillance system in place to prevent any untoward happening in the college. It is widely covered with CCTVs .

6. The garden committee of the college continuously monitors and works to give a beautiful environment to the campus with the help of gardeners and care takers.

7. Office attendants assist in the administrative work and proper maintenance of the college infrastructure.

8. The college has an infirmary for the staff and students and is manned by a full-time qualified doctor.

9. The overall maintenance of the college campus is done under the supervision of the Administrative officer.

10. The college has 45 classrooms, 6 laboratories, two for Physics and Chemistry departments and one each for Mathematics and Computer Science departments. There is one computer lab each with the physics and chemistry depts. Library and Seminar Room are well lit and spacious. Lecture Theatres are equipped with smart boards. Computer lab, Computer Science and Mathematics labs are air-conditioned. The college has a common staff room and a meeting room. The methods and regulations for maintaining and employing infrastructure are geared towards the overall development of our students.Our institution aims to maintain strong academic standards while providing a diverse range of extra-curricular opportunities. The college has a big playground.The Basketball Court, Play Field, Cricket Pitch, Football Uprights and Volleyball Court provides opportunities to students to participate in sports.The college promotes healthy competition, sportsmanship and teamwork among students. Intensive training is imparted under expert guidance and numerous sports activities, various tournaments and competitions are organised every year on the annual sports day before the corona effect for students and faculty. The students of Motilal Nehru College achieved notable distinctions every year and many have been selected for national and state level tournaments. College has provided good sports equipment to the students for sports activities. Changing rooms, drinking water, medical/first aid facilities for students are also available in college. The college has olympic size standard weights for weight-lifting training. Most of the facilities in the college are outdoors, however the college also has facilities for sports like chess which are practiced indoors. Other than the above mentioned facilities, we also have athletes who practice swimming, mounteneering and other sports of which we do not have practice venue in the college but have tie ups with the facilities nearby.

College promotes creative and artistic pursuits. The society performs both stage and street plays and provides the platform for acting, music, creative writing and direction. The Society has 1 Djembe, 1 Xylophone and 1 Ghatam. (2) Malhaar- The music society brings the music from every genration and every corner of the world in its purest forms. Malhaar is divided into 3 wings which are the Indian Classical wing, the western wing, and the band. Malhar Society has 1 Tabla, 1 Drum kit and 1 harmonium (3) Electra is one of the top ten western dance society in the DU circuit.(4) Bellissimo is fashion society. It actively participates in all the fests and fashion shows in Delhi as well as outside .(5) Jhankaar: is the folk dance society and encourages all Indian dance forms. The society keeps the culture of India alive, by sharing and teaching younger generations the varied and beautiful Indian dance forms. Jhankar society has 4 full dresses, 4 sets of Jewellery, 4 paraat and 3 pitchers. This society has 4 dresses, 8 dang and 4 kanchi for Bhangra dance. (6) Chhayankan, is the film and photography society and aims to encourage the students and their stories by giving them a platform. (7) Abhivyanjana- The English and Hindi Debate, Poetry and Creative Writing Society believes in the idea of expression and discover the love for debating, writing, and spoken word. The college provides adequate facilities and required equipment to the societies and well equipped cultural room and surrounded spacious area for the students for their practice.

The college has a large, well-stocked and well-equipped library. All divisions of the library showcase a diverse collection of over 50 thousand volumes and hundreds of periodicals published in India and overseas. It has a diverse collection of 1,19,096 books, To assist visually and physically challenged students, the library provides an enabling unit with a Braille library, computers, and other services such as readings, writers, scans, and printouts. The library also has a book bank where economically weaker students can borrow textbooks. Searching for and referencing titles is now nearly entirely automated. Under the guidance of the teaching staff, books/ journals are purchased are made by the Library Committee in cooperation with the Library staff. A significant number of books/journals/magazines etc. are added every year according to the requirement. All the books are bar-coded. The library was using NETLIB/LIBWARE software. It has three air conditioned reading rooms for students and one room with computer facilities for students and faculty. One OPAC machine (Online Public Access Catalogue) is

accessible with Wi-Fi in the library to ensure easy access to books. The work of Membership, Accessioning, Cataloguing, Issue & Return, Book Reservation, Binding, Stock Verification etc. done by automated system in the library. The Library also provides access e-journals and e-books through N-List Programme of UGC-INFONT. The total seating capacity in library is 150. Library is open 8.30 AM to 5.30 PM for all working days (Monday to Friday) for students. Library is equipped with the CCTV cameras to prevent pilferage and overall monitoring and surveillance of the library.

The procedures and policies followed by the college for maintaining and utilizing the infrastructure are aligned towards the overall development of our students. Our endeavour is to ensure the maintenance of high academic standards along with a number of extra- curricular activities. We have ensured the development and existence of a differently-abled friendly infrastructure. As a result, the physical, academic and support facilities in the college are all differently-abled friendly. Some of the class rooms in the college are air conditioned, and have LCD projectors. The college has a Seminar Room for holding symposia, seminar and conferences. Our library is well-equipped and adequately stocked and also has e-resources and Internet facilities. College provides ample opportunities to its students in Sports and extra-curricular activities and is equipped with a Basketball Court, a Play Field, a Cricket Pitch, Football uprights, and a Volleyball Court. The college has the availability of RO water for all stake holders. It also has a rainwater-harvesting system, a Medical Room, and a Girl's Common Room. The college also has ramps, and an exclusive washroom for differently-abled students, employees and visitors.

Maintenance of physical infrastructure:

1. The library development is done by Library Committee which has an experienced and knowledgeable library staff. Books, magazines etc. are purchased after detailed discussions with the faculty.

2. Each laboratory has devoted lab assistants and attendants to carry out regular maintenance of equipments and take stock of all consumable and non-consumable items.

3. The college has 01 coach for basketball, 01 for yoga apart from 01 attendant and 04 non-teaching staff who serve as ground men.

4. The computers and internet resources and other web enabled facilities in the college campus are provided through well qualified professionals.

5. The college campus has a surveillance system in place to prevent any untoward happening on the campus. It is widely covered with CCTVs .

6. The garden committee of the college continuously monitors and works to give a beautiful environment to the campus with the help of gardeners and care takers.

7. Office attendants assist in the administrative work and proper maintenance of the college infrastructure.

8. The college has an infirmary for the staff and students and is manned by a full-time qualified doctor.

6.2.2 The functioning of the institutional bodies is effective and efficient as visible from policies, administrative setup, appointment, service rules and procedures, etc.

Response:

The organogram of Motilal Nehru College reflects the democratic character and shared responsibilities with which governance takes place. At the apex of the administrative set-up of our College is the Governing body, followed by the Principal. The other administrative positions are that of the Vice-Principal, Secretary Staff Council, Bursar and Co-ordinator IQAC. The Staff council and its various committees execute all activities of the college in an institutionalized manner. The college prepares its academic and administrative targets well in advance for an efficient delivery mechanism. All appointments and promotions are done through an institutional framework and as per UGC guidelines.

- The Governing Body under the leadership of the Chairperson gives direction to administration and decision-making, finances and regulation, purchases and development, and quality assurance of the college. The Governing Body also appoints the Vice Principal and the Bursar in its capacity upon recommendation by the Principal.
- The Principal, as the chief administrator of the college, supervises and manages the overall functioning of the college. The Principal is also the ex-officio chairperson of the Staff Council.
- The Staff Council committees administer decisions related to academics, workload, time table, purchases and maintenance, admissions, discipline and codes of conduct, curricular and extracurricular aspects of the college, subject to the provisions and ordinances of the UGC and the University of Delhi.
- The teachers-in-charge work in collaboration with the Principal and their respective departments in

accomplishing the academic, financial and co-curricular requirements of the departments.

- The Bursar manages the matters related to internal finances of the college. The Bursar also ensure effective utilisation of funds available for college purposes. Financial decisions are taken by the Bursar and the Principal in consultation with the Governing Body.
- The college also has IQAC which works towards realisation of the goals of quality enhancement and sustenance. The IQAC plays an important role for monitoring the internal quality of the institution.
- The Library organization includes Librarian, Professional Assistant, Semi Professional Assistants, Junior Lib. & Information Asstt. and Library attendants.
- The Administrative Staff of the college is also charactersed by a well-defined organisational structure, with positions according to the University rules and the UGC. The administrative decisions are implemented through the Administrative Officer, who is assisted by a team of Section Officers from the administration and the accounts section. The caretaker supervises the maintenance of the infrastructure and the working of housekeeping staff, electricians, gardeners, etc.

6.3.1 The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non-teaching staff

Response:

• The college organises health camps to provide free health check-up and instil awareness about

important health issues such as cardiac wellness, women's health, HIV-AIDS, and mental wellbeing.

- A college-appointed counsellor provides consultation to staff and students to address mental stress and other related issues.
- The college facilitates effective delivery of accounts-related matters to its employees.
- Salaries are disbursed on the last working day of every month, and reimbursements of allowances are processed in a timely manner.
- Medical reimbursements, children education allowance, LTC/HTC, and other allowances like washing and uniform allowance (for Class IV employees) are provided to the employees as per the university rules.
- Life insurance is provided by the college in the form of a Group Insurance Scheme that covers the staff members at low premium.
- There is a Ward Quota scheme for eligible wards (as per University rule) of staff seeking admission in various undergraduate courses at Motilal Nehru College.
- Motilal Nehru College provides a healthy and clean work environment conducive for enhancing productivity at work. Facilities such as air-conditioned staff room, administrative office, department rooms (Chemistry, Physics, Mathematics, Physical Education and Computer Science) and committee rooms serve as important working space outside the classrooms.
- A well-furnished kitchenette adjacent to the staff room is maintained in the college in addition to the cafeteria facilities.
- A dedicated reading room equipped with Wi-Fi enabled computers and printer facilities is available in the library to access e-resources. Teaching staff are also entitled to issuance of fifty books at a time and non-teaching staff are entitled to issuance of twenty books in their name.
- Seminars, conferences, training programmes and FDPs are organised by Motilal Nehru College at national and international level for faculty enrichment purposes and for nurturing a competitive and thriving academic environment.
- For the welfare of the teaching staff, college has an elected staff association and for the nonteaching staff too there is an association in place. The staff association has its own corpus for maintain a pantry in the staffroom and it also helps its members financially in times of need. The Staff Association that acts as a bridge between our college and University teachers' association. It also conducts regular staff picnics, and farewell for our retired staff.
- The Internal College Complaint Committee and WDC hosted webinars on the Role of ICC and Prevention, Prohibition, and Redress of Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace to help people better understand the role of ICC and sexual harassment prevention.
- In the wake of the corona epidemic following welfare measures have been taken:

Appraisal for the teaching staff:

- Appraisal for teaching staff is based on the Performance Based Appraisal Scheme (PBAS) proforma submitted by faculty seeking for promotion.
- The PBAS proforma details individual teachers' teaching-learning and evaluation related activities; research and academic contributions; administrative support and contribution in extra co-curricular activities as had been detailed in UGC-CAS guidelines.
- The appraisal/selection committee, nominated by the Principal, in coordination with IQAC scrutinises the proforma based on the UGC-CAS guidelines and recommends the same for promotion. The process for promotions in Delhi University has now begun, and the first stage of promotion has taken place. (6.3.5: CAS Guidelines 2010/2018)

Appraisal for the non-teaching staff:

The non-teaching staff at Motilal Nehru College comprises a diverse support staff which functions as the backbone of the college. This includes the administrative and accounts staff, the laboratory staff, the library, and housekeeping staff.

- Every year, the performance of the non-teaching staff is reported in the Annual Report of the college in the form of professional training programmes they attended. A confidential self-appraisal report of each non-teaching staff member is prepared by the office and entered in the service book. Apart from this, the teacher-incharge of department regularly evaluate the performance of the laboratory staff through confidential, self-appraisal forms submitted by the support staff. Such mechanism ensures the smooth functioning of the laboratories.
- Appraisal of the non-teaching staff also takes place in the form of assessment for the Best Employee Award. This award was instituted in 2015-2016 by the college as recognition of exemplary standard of commitment and performance in fulfilling his or her duty. The award is conferred on the College Annual Day.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

- Motilal Nehru College receives 95% funds from the UGC and 5% from Delhi Government. Funds are also generated from certain components of students' fees, etc.
- Apart from the above sources, funds are also mobilised from various government and nongovernment sources for the purpose of research and projects. Faculty from several departments apply for research projects under schemes such as several projects funded by University of Delhi, ICSSR, UGC, etc.
- Funds are received from government agencies and members of teaching staff for scholarships for students.

- Private organisations also provide sponsorship for organising department and college festivals. These sponsors are acknowledged in posters, brochures, and other promotional notifications.
- Various government and autonomous bodies are approached for sponsorship of national and international conferences and workshops.
- The college rents out space for canteen.

For efficient and optimum utilisation of resources available, convenors of various staff council committees and teachers-in-charge are asked to provide their requirements at the beginning of the session. This is to ensure timely and routine maintenance and upgradation of laboratories, library, computing facilities, classrooms, and equipment and facilities. According to the requirements submitted by conveners of committees and teachers-in-charge, a budget is prepared and submitted to the Competent Authority for approval. The college committees follow the procedure of procurement of funds as per the general financial rules. All financial documents and bills are processed by the accounts section, the bursar and the principal. Transparency is maintained through the entire process and allocated funds are optimally utilised.

Response:

The first cycle of Motilal Nehru College was completed in February, 2016. It was in this very year that IQAC was formed in this college. Since then IQAC has taken certain initiatives to improve the academic environment of the college. The institution reviews its teaching learning process, structures & methodologies of operations and learning outcomes at periodic intervals through IQAC set up as per norms and recorded the incremental improvement in various activities.

Review of learning-outcome takes place by evaluating students' interactions in classroom, participation in co-curricular activities, performance in internal assessment and semester end examinations. This exercise is based on the final internal assessment reports submitted by the teachers-in-charge of all departments after moderating the marks of students in all papers taught in the department.

Teaching and Learning reforms: The IQAC at Motilal Nehru College encourage and ensures continual reforms in teaching-learning methodologies. It lays impetus on the adoption of ICT in teaching practices. Teachers use licensed software like Mathematica (for computing), free statistical tools, MS office and Tally.ERP 9 for financial accounting. During COVID-19, teaching-learning has been supported by various virtual platforms like Google meet, Google class-room, zoom etc. These tools are used for video-lecture and interaction, sharing study materials, and assessing assignments. Digital library facilities like DELLNET-NLIST and DU e-resources provide a repository of articles and e-books for teaching and research purposes. IQAC in last five years also successfully scrutinised the promotion forms of the faculty members to maintain high-standard in education. This exercise also leads to periodic review of teacher's performance.

It may also be noted that students from diverse background and the students with special need are also taken care-off during the teaching-learning processes college support is provided by purchase of JAWS, (a screen reading software) Braille books, scanner, and devoted computers for these students.

Protecting and nurturing the environment is one of the fundamental philosophies of Motilal Nehru College. According to the Global E-waste Monitor 2020 Report, a record 53.6 million tonnes of e-waste was generated in 2019, with just 17.4% getting recycled. India produced 3.2 million tonnes of e-waste, becoming the third largest producer in the world. Considering such a grave situation, Motilal Nehru College committed itself to manage its nondegradable waste and spread awareness among its fraternity regarding the same. Another important degradable resource that needs attention is paper. The Supreme Court of India issued a circular in March 2020 to use only A4 size and double side printed paper for all court proceedings. Likewise, Motilal Nehru College judiciously uses paper in its offices and for academic activities. The college has already signed an agreement with a NGO, Jaagruti: for Waste Paper Recycling Services, thereby lowering the impact of paper as the third largest polluter and saving the trees. Water management is the most crucial aspect of survival today, for which a well-planned infrastructure has been established in the college. A rainwater harvesting structure is installed, which helps to alleviate water stress issues during summers. The college uses waste RO water for gardening purposes.

The college actively participates in the Swachh Bharat Abhiyaan by ensuring proper sanitation facilities, dustbins on the campus, and hygiene in the toilets

7.2 Best Practices

7.2.1 Describe two best practices successfully implemented by the Institution as per NAAC format

Response:

The Internal College Complaint Committee and WDC hosted webinars on the Role of ICC and Prevention, Prohibition, and Redress of Sexual Harassment of Women at Workplace to help people better understand the role of ICC and sexual harassment prevention. A number of sessions for the staff and students were held to sensitise them towards gender issues. WDC over the year organised discussions on varied topics the details of which are given below: 1. Book Discussion Session of "A Feminist Manifesto in Fifteen Suggestion" was held on 30th August and again on 27 September, 2020 in which a detailed explanation and discussion of all 15 suggestions mentioned in the book was done so that the participants can get a clear insight about its content. 2. "Societal norms limits our carrier choices" This session focussed on the jobs seen as masculine and feminine in a patriarchal world. An attempt was made to understand how to break free from the shackles of prejudices that are associated with jobs. This session was organised on 22nd October, 2020. 3. An activity named: "Stereotypes we witness during festivals" in which 48 students participated was held on 10th January, 2021. The session focussed on how stereotypes follow us in various festivals which are generally overlooked. Annual Quality Assurance Report of MOTI LAL NEHRU COLLEGE 4. On 15th January, 2021, WDC organised a Webinar in collaboration with BeArtsy India on the topic "Financial Literacy" under their campaign "Be your own Lakshmi". The founder Shikha Mittal enlightened us with all the important aspects of financial independence which holds utmost importance for us youngsters today. 5. Gender centric prejudices are deeply ingrained in our being and the Institutionalized patriarchal oppression reflects on our daily life but we fail to recognize them. The session "Casual Sexism" was held on 7th February, 2021, attended by 42 participants. It was an attempt to recognize these behaviours of ours as well as other people around us. 6. A seminar on "Lighting it out" was held on 8 th March2021. The event was conducted with two very brave survivors from Stop Acid Attacks Organization, an initiative by Chhavn Foundation and attended by 50 participants. 7. Getting acquainted with terms used for gender identities was the theme of the next activity named "Terms used for gender identities" organised on 14th March, 2021. 8. WDC, MLNC organized their Annual fest BEBAKH literally meaning Fearless on 6th and 7th April 2021. The fest was attended by 76 participants and various competitive activities like Debate, Meme Making and Photography Competition were held over two days. 9.On 12 June 2021, an internal session on "Plight of transgenders Amidst COVID 19" was held. Marginalized communities are more vulnerable to any kind of adversity, so this session focused on trying to be more informed about the condition of our fellow human beings and becoming a better version of ourselves with every passing day. 10. On 19 June 2021, WDC organised a talk session on "Be gentle to yourself you are doing the best you can". At times we need someone to just pour our hearts out and this session was that safe space where we talked about similar topics. 11. On 29 June 2021, Men's Health week was celebrated. In this session we talked about men's mental health. We discussed how patriarchy oppresses men and they're expected to act in manner and are frowned upon when they're not 'masculine' enough.

7.3 Institutional Distinctiveness

7.3.1 Portray the performance of the Institution in one area distinctive to its priority and thrust within 1000 words

Response:

It is highlighted in the vision of the college that it is highly committed to the cause of providing affordable education to all sections of society. Towing this idea the college through its statutory body namely- the Staff Council has deliberated upon the issue in depth. It may be noted that the current policies of the government in the domain of higher education focus on autonomy and self-financing whereas, we have a sizeable number of students who find it difficult to make both ends meet. Keeping in view such students, the issue of raising fees was deliberated in detail in the staff council, and countering the idea of selffinancing approach, the staff council decided to marginally increase the fees. It is therefore imperative that by not increasing the fees substantially, the college is adhering to its vision of providing affordable and quality education to a wider section of society. Augmenting it, the college also adheres to its policy of inclusiveness be it the women, underprivileged sections of society, sexual minorities. It may also be noted that many departments of the College had been providing special concession to women candidates so as to bring them at par with men candidates. The college therefore, has an important role in providing quality education to the women-folk of our society. Augmented to it is the all-inclusive approach of the college to provide equal opportunities to students from weaker sections of our society. Motilal Nehru College ensures that constitutional obligation of providing reservation to students from such sections is fulfilled in letter and spirit. The college had therefore, been lowering the admission percentage for such sections keeping in view the objective of providing opportunity to many students belonging to Schedule Caste/ tribe/ Economically weaker sections/ Other Backward Classes/ women/ sexual minorities, and differently abled students.

It is worth mentioning here that many students from such lots still find it difficult to make both ends meet owing to their meagre financial resources. The College again comes to their rescue at this stage by providing such students with fee concession. All this is done by the fee concession committee of the college. One of the major achievements during the Covid period was the monitoring of students by their teachers. Some of the teachers went personally to meet their students in order to take care of their mental health, social and moral well-being.

5. CONCLUSION

Additional Information :

- In the wake of the Covid pandemic, the college hosted a series of webinars on how to maintain one's physical and emotional health.
- On the issue of open book exams (OBE) held by the University as a one-time contingent measure, several departments organized online talks with students to apprise them of the nitty-gritty of this new model of examination and advise them on maintaining ethical propriety while taking the exams from home.
- While the Alumni Association organizes alumni meets every year, the meet could not be held in 2020-21 due to the Covid-induced lock-down and restrictions on assembly. Nevertheless, the association conducted two online meets as part of 'Vox Alumni: Alumni Talk Series' in April 2022 that attracted enthusiastic participation, and the wide online circulation of Google forms for registration substantially increased the number of enrolled alumni. Besides enrolment, monetary contribution of the alumni, too, has been steadily increasing.
- In the last five years, 10 teachers received their PhD degrees, taking the total percentage of doctorates to over 50, while almost half of the teachers attended various Faculty Development Programmes. Eleven teachers are recognized as supervisors/guides for research scholars.
- While the last two years remained uneventful as far as outdoor extension activities are concerned due to the pandemic, before 2020 the college had initiated a plantation drive through which students were asked not only to plant a sapling but also to take responsibilities of watering and protecting it for a year, after which they would be given a Green Student Certificate.
- The college, through a leading NGO, Connecting Dreams Foundation (CDF), has been tirelessly working since 2017 to empower people through entrepreneurial opportunities and improve their livelihoods in an economically, socially and environmentally sustainable way. More than a hundred of our students have been able to reach out to over 70 communities with a number of innovative projects such as Project Dream library, Project Jazbaat and Project Udyam.

Concluding Remarks :

Motilal Nehru College stands at the threshold of a new exciting era of higher education in the wake of unprecedented virtualization of teaching-learning process, and growing emphases on innovative pedagogical methods, interdisciplinary curricula, flexibility in course-choices and entry-and-exit options, outcome-based education for students of diverse backgrounds through their native languages and in sync with their cultural values and settings, and self-reliance and employability of youth through the development of requisite knowledge-base and skillsets. These new focus-areas are encapsulated by GoI's New Education Policy (NEP) that the college is to implement from academic session 2022-23. In addition, the upcoming implementation of Central Universities Common Entrance Test (CUCET) as a standardized method for admission to courses in central universities is a remarkable departure from the conventional percentage-based criterion for admissions that is fast losing its relevance in assessing the applicants' real aptitude and competency for studying various courses. The college is beginning to engage all its stakeholders (teachers, students, non-teaching staff) and all its resources and facilities in re-orienting its overall educational compass towards the new goalposts. At the same time, the college is committed to its core philosophy of providing an affordable, holistic and inclusive education as a tool of empowering and enabling the youth. Hence, the college is at once steadfast and proud in retaining its principled and non-commercial approach to education, and flexible and dynamic in adapting to the

dynamic educational scenario.
